DWWT evaluates the consequences of the aid basing on the principle of 'Do not harm first!' of medicine; and calculates the individual, social and environmental impact. It is a moral obligation for Doctors Worldwide Turkey not to harm anybody while trying to aid.

AUTONOMY AND BRIEFING

DWWT informs the patients about the details of the medical treatment, the possible consequences and complications that may be encountered by the medical intervention in accordance with the autonomy which is the basic principle of medical ethics and the precondition for good medicine.

LEGITIMATE AND SCIENTIFIC METHOD APPLICATION

DWWT executes its projects by applying the proven diagnosis and treatment methods, based on the principles of preventive medicine. In any case, DWWT never uses non-scientific methods in diagnosis and treatment of patients and never uses any chemical, pharmacological or biological substances that have not been through the necessary scientific steps and have not been appropriately licensed yet.

PRIVACY

DWWT does not share the information of the patients in need of medical support with third parties without getting the patient's consent and approval.

RESPECT FOR HUMAN AND DOCTOR'S NEUTRALITY

DWWT respects human health, human life, and personality in their activities. DWWT gives the utmost care and attention when examining and treating the patients, with no discrimination based on gender, race, nationality, religion, sect, ethical angles, personality, social status and political view.


NOT BEING INVOLVED IN UNAUTHORIZED AREAS

DWWT, when on duty, does not engage in any attempt that requires special knowledge or skills that it does not possess, except when there are compulsory cases where any delay may threaten a patient's life.

EMERGENCIES AND WAR

DWWT implements universal rules of medical ethics with impartiality under all circumstances and conditions.

DWWT assists people in need of medical help in extraordinary situations such as war, deportation, and asylum, within the framework of universal legal principles.





EMERGENCY SERVICES

DWWT sets up teams to provide emergency response, aid, and treatment services in all extraordinary situations such as war or crisis, while it also dispatches medical supplies, equipment, and medicines for this purpose.



PREVENTIVE HEALTH SERVICES

DWWT organizes awareness raising and vaccination activities to prevent epidemics of common diseases and to eliminate its threats to people's health. It treats severe nutritional disorders by opening maternity, infant health and nutrition centers for children and pregnant women who do not have access to basic food supplies and therefore affected negatively. DWWT also develops projects on women's health. In addition, it organizes Qurbani and its distribution activities as a nutritional supplement. In order to prevent HIV/AIDS, DWWT also organizes camps for the circumcision of children.



MEDICAL HEALTH SERVICES

DWWT develops projects and programs to cure diseases that cannot be cured with local resources by both surgical and internal medicine practitioners, and coordinates volunteer healthcare teams in this

HEALTH EDUCATION PROJECTS



EMERGENCY SERVICES

PHILLIPPINES TYPHON, PHILLIPPINES (2013)

Typhoon Haiyan started to wreak havoc in the Philippines on Friday, November 8, 2013, affecting more than 16 million people. At least 6,300 people lost their lives and nearly 28,700 others were injured. Furthermore, more than 1.000 people reported as missing. 489,600 houses were destroyed and 595,100 others were damaged.

DWWT established a field hospital on November 25, 2013, in Dagami area, which was affected by the typhoon and has a population of 45,000 people. This hospital included a pharmacy and provided health services in the fields of pediatrics, wound care, examination, circumcision, and vaccination, to 1,651 disaster victims, 29% of whom were children under 5 years old, this was executed with the support of 3 voluntary medical teams assigned from Turkey. In addition to the medical support, the official health center, which is located next to the field hospital opened in collaboration with Global Medic, DWWT's support partner during the operation, was repaired. The total cost of the aid provided was 63,000\$ and the total value of the service provided was 171,900\$.





WAR AND CRISIS-STRICKEN REGIONS

SYRIA CRISIS (2011-2013)

Following the conflicts that emerged in Syria after the Arab Spring upraising and as it developed to be a long-term crisis, DWWT launched aid activities for the Syrian people who took refuge in other places since March 2013.

In the Wadi Khaled district, located 700 m. away from the Lebanese border, a triage center was founded in collaboration with Islamic Medical Association (IMA) Lebanon to transfer the wounded patients to the hospitals located in the inner regions. The center is equipped with 2 fully equipped ambulances, a 4x4 patient transport vehicle, and necessary medical equipment. In sum, medicines and consumables conveyed to the center worth around 11,9 million \$ and, in addition, wounded people were treated by 3 voluntary healthcare teams.

28.01.2012-05.02.2012

Voluntary Health Care Team

A voluntary health care team composed of eight members has been services in Lebanon between 7 conveyed in order to provide voluntary and 11 April 2012 in order to health care services to Syrian refugees located at the Lebanese border because of the humanitarian tragedy in Syria, and to Palestinian refugees located at Beddawi and Nahr examinations and 1 wounded al-Bared refugee camps from 28 January to 5 February, 2012, 1070 medical examinations were carried out, of which 471 were eye examinations, 800 glasses, and 1600 boxes of drugs were delivered. Along with this voluntary team, a sum of 50.000\$ donation amount was delivered to IMA-Lebanon to meet emergency medical and drug needs.



07.04.2012-11.04.2012

Voluntary Health Care Team

DWWT provided health care identify the wounded patients and classify the cases; during this time 11 plastic surgery operations were planned as a result of 25 elective patient was operated.

01.06.2012 -03.06.2012

Voluntary Health Care Team

Within the scope of Health Neighboring Spring in Geographies project, DWWT's voluntary health care team provided health service in Lebanese Tripoli Al Shifa Hospital between 1 and 3 June 2012, 15 patients were examined and 7 critical surgical operations were performed within this period.

Humanitarian aid activities have also been initiated on the Turkish border as the conflict in Syria moved towards the northern region of the country. In this context, the following activities were conducted;

- A pharmacy was opened in Syria and drug shipment into Syria maintained with the coordination of DWWT Reyhanli Representation.
- A health station was established in Hatay Yayladagi. Polyclinic services were provided to an average of 50-100 patients per day in this center, which serves the refugees stationed outside the refugee camps.
- Surgical kits for medical staff and first aid kits for the public were prepared and distributed in order to reduce the number of causalities or injuries due to late intervention.

Doctors Worldwide Turkey supported "One Bread One Blanket" campaign, which was carried out by humanitarian organizations within the framework of UNIW (The Union of NGOs of the Islamic World).

PREVENTIVE HEALTH SERVICES

MATERNITY, INFANT HEALTH AND NUTRITION CENTERS

Doctors Worldwide Turkey develops projects to conduct routine check-ups for pregnant women in addition to health check-ups of pregnant and nursing mothers as well as vaccination of children and reduction of the mortality rate of children under the age of 5.

After the "Horn of Africa Crisis" in July 2011, 3 nutrition health centers were opened in 2011 and 2012; and they operated for 1 year to help solve the health issues caused by drought and malnutrition in Somalia. Furthermore, after the needs were evaluated, it was decided to open a center in Niger; and services were provided in that center until September 2013.

These centers, which were established in cooperation with the UNICEF, diagnosed children suffering from severe malnutrition, treated children with therapeutic formulas under the supervision of physicians and nutritionists, and monitored the children for 3 to 6 months to ensure their recovery. A pharmacy was established in these centers to provide drugs to the patients. Moreover, primary health care services were provided in these centers to children having health problems not based on nutrition.

- We have co-operated with SOYDA (Somalian Young Doctors Association) in the centers opened in Hodan and Lafole in Somalia, also Turkish Religious Foundation provided fund of 42.857\$.
- IMANA (Islamic Medical Association of North of America) donated 125.000\$ to the center opened in Yagshid, Somalia.
- Gonul Birligi provided 45.000\$ for the center opened in Tillabéri, Niger.





OBSTETRIC FISTULA

As a result of interviews and researches carried out during our visits to Mauritania in 2013, the necessity to support maternity, infant, and nutrition health system has emerged in that region, also project designing for supporting existing centers was performed.

An obstetric fistula is a hole between the vagina and rectum or bladder that is caused by prolonged or obstructed labor, early marriage and early childbirth, and non-availability of medical care during delivery, etc.

The most apparent symptoms of the obstetric fistula are the continuous urinary or fecal incontinence and bleeding. Nerve damage caused by the leaking can make it difficult or even impossible for women to walk. Women can reduce fluid consumption to prevent constant leaking, however, this may create life-threatening risks due to dehydration. Furthermore, because of the unavoidable odor caused by the disease, women become isolated from social life. There are thousands of untreated women, who are grieving because of the loss of their babies, abandoned on the other hand by their husbands, and disowned by their families. Only 7,5% of women with fistula are able to access treatment while millions end up suffering from the consequences of the disease.

DWWT has contributed by performing surgeries on fistula patients and assisting them to undergo the surgery. Health care teams have been sent to Niger to provide treatment for 99 cases by performing operations at Lamordé Hospital, Maradi State Hospital, and Niamey Fistula Centers. By 2013, DWWT prepared a broader program to include various preventive and medical services on the subject, and developed projects for the architecture and management of the fistula center by TIKA (Turkish Cooperation and Coordination Agency) in Niger.




CIRCUMCISION

DWWT organizes circumcision services as preventive health service against sexually transmitted diseases such as AIDS. In this context, thousands of children were circumcised in Kenya, Congo, Georgia, Syria, Turkey, Macedonia and Bulgaria. "Hatay - Yayladagi Circumcision Ceremony" was organized for the refugee children in Turkey as a part of preventive health services and against the inconveniences that may occur because of wrong circumcision practices. In the scope of "We Circumcise the Syrian Refugees, Be Their Protector" campaign, DWWT health care volunteers circumcised 69 Syrian boys living in tent cities and houses in Yayladagi district, it also donated 50 TL to each circumcised child.

QURBANI MEAT PROGRAM & FOOD AIDS

There are people in many parts of the world, suffering from starvation for reasons such as natural disasters like floods, tropical storms, long-term famines, wars, domestic disturbances, disorders on agricultural infrastructure, lack of education or overexploitation of the regions. The programs that are dedicated to proper and balanced nutrition are amongst the most important preventative health services. DWWT contributes to balanced and proper nutrition by Qurbani meat donation and food aids in the regions where it provides health services, particularly in Africa where the world's 25 least developed and poor countries are located.

We do not increase the number of countries where we implement Qurbani meat program, because we work to reach rural parts of countries like Niger, DR Congo, Kenya, Somalia, Ghana, and Sierra Leone, where we provide ordinarily health services.

DWWT distributes food and hot meals during the holy month of Ramadan, mostly in the centers where we provide health care services.



WATER WELLS

According to international standards, the amount of water that a person consumes per day Is estimated to be 50 lt. In many regions of Africa, even if people have water resources, they cannot reach clean water due to technical barriers. Every year thousands of adults and children get sick for this reason. They lose their lives because of diseases related. Access to clean water is the most crucial preventive health service and is often more important and efficient than other medical services. Doctors Worldwide Turkey drilled three water wells in Niger in 2013.

ROUGAGUIN RABA WATER WELL


The well was drilled in the village of Rougaguin Raba in the Tessaoua district. There are around 500 people living in the village along with 3000 animals. Before inauguration of the well, villagers had to walk 3 km. to reach the nearest well.

KATSINAWA WATER WELL


The well was drilled in the village of Katsinawa. There are 1.250 people living in the village together with 1.350 animals. Before the inauguration of the well, villagers had to walk 3 km to reach the nearest well.

DILO PEUL WATER WELL

There are 1.300 people in Dilo Peul village and 2.350 animals. Formerly, they had to walk 5 km to go to the nearest well.



The number of physicians in underdeveloped countries is very low compared to our country. The number of physicians, capable of performing the necessary examinations, surgeries and drug treatment for complicated cases, is very limited. DWWT's voluntary health care teams are tailored and organized according to the needs of the regions they are sent to in order to treat such difficult cases where they are located with less cost. Moreover, medicines, surgical supplies and necessary equipment used in the treatment process are conveyed with these teams.




DWWT provided health care on a total of 163 days (45% of a year) through organizing 20 voluntary health care teams. With the contribution of 142 volunteers, performed 5,332 examinations and 700 operations which estimated to worth 846,000\$, and costs 740,000\$, of which 242,000\$ was the voluntary contribution. Additionally, two of the teams were supported with technicians while seven teams used need assessment tool. The contribution percentage of DWWT to the mentioned projects is 46%. The contribution percentage of TİKA (Turkish Cooperation and Coordination Agency), the strategic partner, is 34% while the the contribution percentage of local partners is 20%.



Since 2007, DWWT has been organizing voluntary health care teams to help particularly the children. In this context, 17 voluntary teams have been organized in Palestine, Yemen, Azerbaijan, Somalia, Mauritania, and Sudan, performing 2,373 examinations and 880 surgeries, The budget was estimated to reach 1,000,000\$ in total.

AID FOR MEDICINES AND MEDICAL EQUIPMENT

1.7 billion people on earth (comprising 30% of the world population) do not use any medicine along their life. However, it appears that 1/3 of the malaria drugs used in Africa are counterfeit drugs. Saving 10 million people per year would be possible by only enabling access to medicines.

DWWT helps underdeveloped and developing countries with medicines and medical supplies in line with their needs. Medicines and medical supplies donated by pharmaceutical companies or purchased with cash donations are conveyed together with voluntary health care teams to hospitals, clinics, and maternity, infant and nutrition health centers, which are opened in the regions, to be used prior in emergency situations.

Averagely 150 patients per day received polyclinic services in gynecology, obstetrics, pediatrics, internal medicine, general surgery and emergency sections in the hospital equipped with 66 beds, 74 personnel and 1 ambulance. Somalian doctors, who completed their undergraduate study, worked in the polyclinics of gynecology, pediatrics and internal medicine, after improving their experience by working in several hospitals in Turkey. In addition, voluntary health care teams visited the hospital periodically to provide different polyclinic and surgery services according to their specialty. Moreover, voluntary health care teams organized in-house training sessions to Somalian staff.



Somalian doctors, who are trained by DWWT within the scope of expertise training organized in cooperation with Istanbul Medeniyet University and Benadir University, proceed their practical training at Al-Shifa Hospital. In this regard, Al-Shifa Hospital has possibly been the only teaching hospital in the last period.

Thanks to its equipment, Al-Shifa Hospital has become the most prominent, hospital, the teams coming from Republic of Turkey Ministry of Health visiting Sahara Hospital have occasionally used the operating rooms of Al-Shifa Hospital. Within the scope of health week, the surgical team of Republic of Turkey Ministry of Health performed 105 operations in one week at Al-Shifa Hospital in 2013.

Furthermore, DWWT being a member of Al-Shifa Hospital Management and Somali Health Cluster, has played a remarkable role in determining Somalia's 5-year health strategy by sharing its opinions and statistics with Somali Ministry of Health, WHO and UNICEF.




LEBANON BLOOD BANK

Many wounded patients were transferred to Lebanon from Syria during the ongoing Syrian crisis, as they are sharing land border. Lebanese branch (IMA) of the Federation of Islamic Medical Associations (FIMA), of which DWWT is a member, has a hospital in Tripoli, Lebanon, called Dar El-Shifa. However, this hospital, being the only health center to provide free of charge health service to refugees, was not equipped with a laboratory and blood bank. Thus, the treatment needs of the patients were impossible to identify. Consequently, in order to determine the treatment needs of the wounded patients, equipment consisting of following units has been conveyed.

- Chemistry Analyzer
- Immunology Analyzer
- Electrolyte Analyzer Esaylyte Plus
- Apheresis Unit

TIKA funded these units, which are worth 350,000 TL, while DWWT was responsible for purchasing, logistics and installation.





GAZA EQUIPMENT PROJECT

Due to the ongoing attacks and embargoes on Gaza strip, where about 1.5 million Palestinians live in a 360-km2 area, also due to the lack of qualifications in the field of health and its branches, some cases could only be treated by doctors coming from abroad and some patients were expected to go abroad for treatment. Accordingly, DWWT donated the following surgical sets to Gaza hospitals in order to increase the surgical capacity in terms of war and trauma surgery, also to establish eye phaco surgery, orthopedic arthroscopic surgery and neurosurgery microsurgery centers, non-existent until then in Gaza.

- Eye phaco set- European Hospital
- Orthopedic arthroscopic set Nasser Hospital
- Neurosurgery microscope set Shifa Hospital

TiKA funded the sets, which cost 184.000\$, the equipment was purchased in Turkey and DWWT provided training to the doctors in the relevant hospitals on how to use the devices.





HEALTH EDUCATION PROJECTS

DWWT organizes education, certification and specialization programs at associate degree or undergraduate, and graduate levels in order to increase the capacity of health workers in the countries it serves and supports scientific research and activities by coordinating scientific congresses.









Somalia National Health Conference

DWWT organized the Somalia National Health Conference between 7 and 9 November 2013 in Somalia, to provide long term support to this area, suffering from serious health problems due to humanitarian crises and civil wars. The conference, held in Mogadishu, the capital city, aims to revive the health sector as well as to encourage the health personnel living abroad to return to Somalia. Moreover, Somalian President Hassan Sheikh Momaoud, Prime Minister Abdi Farah Shirdoon and Minister of Health Dr. Maryan Qasim made a speech during the conference. DWWT participated in the conference with three delegates while the United National officials, civil society stakeholders and nearly 200 other international and national academicians participated.



Turkey-Yemen Emergency Medicine Congress

DWWT, while maintaining its health education activities in Yemen in 2013, it organized the 1st Turkey-Yemen Emergency Medicine Congress between 17-19 December, 2013 in cooperation with Istanbul Medenivet University and Sana'a Science and Technology University. The congress tackled the health education need following the Arab Spring.





Somalia Specialization on Medicine Program Ibni Sina Health Vocational School

Until January 2013, no institution offered medicine specialization trainings in Somalia, where the undergraduate education on medicine is also very limited. Consequently, Somalian general practitioners had to develop themselves by either going abroad for education or by monitoring the examinations and surgeries performed by voluntary doctors who visited Somalia. Hence, DWWT initiated Somalia Specialization on Medicine Program established between Benadir University as the only teaching hospital close to international standards in Somalia, and Istanbul University, in order to fulfill this deficiency.

Ten practitioners were elected as assistant surgeons after passing an exam in Benadir University in 2013 and started to receive specialization training in 'General Surgery' and 'Emergency & Trauma Surgery'. Doctors attended training in the main branch of General Surgery at Istanbul University Göztepe Training and Research Hospital for 2 months every year. Trainings given in Turkey throughout 2013 exceeded 1600 hours in total. Additionally, in the same year, two separate voluntary health care teams visited Somalia in short intervals to provide specialization trainings and evaluating exams and projects.



One of the educational projects carried out to contribute and increase the capacity of health workers in Somalia was to open a vocational health school in Mogadishu, which have an estimated population of around 2.5 million. Ibni Sina Vocational School started education with 3 departments including Nursing, Midwifery and Laboratory Technician in the academic year of 2013-2014 while the following specialities are planned to be opened in the academic year of 2014-2015; Anesthetist Technician, Radiology Technician, Dental Technician, Assistant Pharmacist and Eye Technician.

The training period of the department varies from 2 to 4 years. Moreover, during the education period, students are offered internship programs in leading hospitals of the region such as Somali Shifa Hospital, Figi Foundation Hospital and Benadir University Hospital.

WORLDWIDE



DWWT initiated 'an urgent drug call for Syria' in order to deliver medicines and medical supplies to Syrian refugees living on the border provinces of Turkey and to the inner regions of Syria.



DWWT transferred medical supplies, which worth 171,000\$, collected for Syrian people with the help of donors, to Hatay Yayladagi region of Turkey.



After receiving an e-mail from the UN, DWWT accepted to treat at Shifa Hospital Abdulaziz Abdullahi Mahmud, a young cachetic patient from Mogadishu that the hospitals did not accept on the pretext that he was about to die. Being unable to nourish and suffering for a long time, his chances for survival were less than 20%, Abdulaziz was discharged from the hospital 8 days after performing a surgery in Somalia Al-Shifa Hospital. Abdulaziz, who will not be able to walk of rest of his life, said that he never regretted it. He said: "I do not suffer anymore and I can eat food. Even that is enough for me to be happy".



DWWT selected the new president and members of the Board of Directors at the General Assembly of 2013. Hence, Prof. Dr. M. İhsan Karaman transferred his President duties to Dr. Kerem Kınık. Dr. Kerem Kınık his speech stating that DWWT is going to reach every region in the world, which needs help in the new period.



Within the scope of Somalia Health week activities, Ministry of Health doctors worked day and night and performed 105 operations in plastic surgery, urology, pediatrics and general surgery in 6 days. Moreover, the doctors, who stayed in DWWT questhouse, performed all of the operations in DWWT Al-Shifa Hospital, which provides health services in Mogadishu to Somalian people, since March 6, 2012. Consequently, this collaboration took its place in the Somalian health history as one of the successful partnerships between governmental and nongovernmental organizations.



In sum, DWWT conveyed 141.750 boxes of medicine to Reyhanli, with a market value of 3.250.000 TL. Thus, the sum of medicine conveyed to the region by DWWT since the beginning of the conflict reached 19.000.000 TL. Medicines are conveyed to DWWT's health center providing free of charge health care services in Reyhanli, to DWWT pharmacy located in Syria and to the other hospitals in Svria.

141.750 boxes of medicine crossed Syrian border from Reyhanli to Atme town. Hereby, the distribution of medicine started in Aleppo, Idilib, Ragga, Deir ez-Zor, Hama and Homs.



Prof. Dr. Ali İhsan Dokucu, as Istanbul Provincial Health Director at the same time a volunteer in DWWT, went to Somalia with 15 volunteer health care team sent to the region by DWWT. Particularly the need for specialists in pediatrics diseases was evident, thus the doctors are welcomed with joy by the people of the region. The team that successfully performed many difficult operations in Somalia gave training to the local staff working at the hospital and the students of Benadir University Medical School where DWWT organizes Medical Specialization exams.

During the suicide attack targeting the Supreme Court building in Mogadishu, the capital of Somalia, three Turkish Red Crescent personnel - Kenan Kongur, Murat Demirbaş and Fatih Çelik – were wounded while a Somalian employee of Turkish Red Crescent team lost his life. Volunteer Turkish doctors working in DWWT Al-Shifa Hospital carried out the first treatment of the wounded. Two of the wounded were operated in Al-Shifa Hospital and the shrapnel piece that hit their bodies were cleaned. The third wounded had an outpatient treatment.

Dr. Kerem Kınık, President of DWWT, stated that the incidents in Somalia were very sad. Kınık mentioned that there was no attack against the Red Crescent or Turkish people until then, and that it was a great misfortune that the Red Crescent was crossing from this region; "Red Crescent personnel is working with great devotion in this area to relieve the oppressed people. We are extremely upset because of the incident however; we are relieved when we think they are on safe hands in our Hospital. "



Within the scope of Smiling Children project, DWWT's voluntary health team went to Somalia Al Shifa Hospital in order to perform cleft palate operations, performing 57 cleft palate operations in addition to 3 microsurgery operations.

DWWT launched a SMS campaign for the donation of blood bag to Niger due arrival of the rainy season, as the epidemic of malaria was expected and the number of blood bag available in the region was critically low.



Dr. Maryam Qaasim, Somalia Minister of Health visited DWWT.



Dr. Osman Figi, Somalia representative of DWWT was martyred by armed men as he went out from the mosque after tarawih prayer near Mogadishu, the capital of Somalia. According to eyewitnesses, some people asked the doctor his name and then shot him several times in the head. Dr. Figi was a patriot who had studied abroad and was a citizen of Canada. He returned to Somalia to assist his people despite the fact that he was working in the United States of America in decent conditions. Additionally, he spoke fluent English, Arabic, Farsi, Urdu and Shawili languages and was a respectable maxillofacial surgeon. In addition, Figi was the Dean of Faculty of Dentistry at Benadir University and a member of the Board of Trustees in the Somalia Health Vocational School that we will open together. Indeed, he was one of the leading architects of the DWW's success in Somalia. Figi worked with DWWT, regardless of the threats he had received. We could only wish safety for him and for our brothers, working with us. He could not see his child who would be born 10 days before his death. He was martyred after his last prayer in front of his father in this heinous attack. He was ritually clean as well. May god bless his soul.



2.5 month pregnant Selva Hasan, escaped with her husband from El-Gizah region of Syria because of the war, she requested help from DWWT with the support of their neighbors. She was treated under the supervision of doctors at Başakşehir Medical Center, of which Specialist Doctor Yahyahan Güney, Secretary General of DWWT, is the Chairman of the Board. She was admitted to the hospital for delivery on July 12. The refugee baby named Dimar received his first gifts from the hospital staff.



DWWT conducted hearing screening at Nene Teresa School of Hearing and Speech Disabilities in Prizren, Kosovo between 16 and 19 July. 103 students aged between 3 and 23 were examined, hearing measurements were performed. appropriate devices were identified and ear molds have been taken for new

Two Ear, Nose and Throat Specialist Doctors, voluntary doctors of DWWT and 2 audiometricians participated in this hearing, that was hosted by the Turkish Parliamentarian Fikrim Damka, the President of the Kosovo Parliamentary Health Commission and with the support of the school administration and teachers. Examinations, measurements and applications lasted for 3 days; we were highly affected by the adaptation and the interest of the students and their families. The wife of Foreign Minister, Specialist Doctor Sare Davutoğlu, Participating in the screening sessions, had official meetings with Kosovo's Minister of Health and Public Administration. One of the Kosovans who visited the teams during the screenings, Mrs. Ater, said "I was giving voluntary lessons in this school, but over time I gave up for various reasons. I am very touched to see you coming all the way from Turkey and I decided to continue to giving my lessons. "Later on, she brought her brother, who graduated from Konya Selçuk University Faculty of Medicine and made him a volunteer at the DWWT.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGIES

As DWWT maintained its stability on growth, DWWT focused on building a stronger IT infrastructure, technology, and process renewal as well as the efficiency improvement of the existing system and IT department functioned according to the increased number of personnel. donation, and donors. Increased productivity has increased both the quality of the service that DWWT provides to corporate donators and ensured that the transactions of the institution are recorded in a robust manner.

PHYSICAL SERVER

Thanks to Optimum Server's investment made in 2012, a resource has been provided to fulfill the needs in this field in the middle term. Virtualization Technology: Due to the increased volume of data, the Information Technology department has been able to take advantage of Microsoft Hyper-V virtualization technologies, which can replace low configuration servers. Microsoft Dynamics CRM is an application intended for customer relationship management and has been donated by Bill Gates Foundation. Thanks to growing number of donors,




